Don't Miss the Florida Forever Benefit Concert featuring Florida Folk Sensations Amy Carol Webb and The Ashley Gang Jacksonville · January 21, 2008 · 7PM · Theatre Jacksonville

Florida Forever is one of the country's most strategic land conservation programs, acquiring wildlands to benefit Florida's wildlife and people. While the accomplishments of this program are many, its funding officially runs out in 2010. Nevertheless, many parcels remain to be acquired if we hope to protect the most remarkable natural features in Florida's landscape.

Audubon of Florida along with many of the state's other conservation organizations recognize this need for a successor to Florida Forever, to continue the momentum of this essential program. Working together with leaders in the Florida legislature, we are seeking a commitment from the state for funding of land conservation for the next decade.

Florida's leading folk music organization, the Will McLean Foundation, also recognizes the importance of raising awareness and funding to fuel this advocacy, and has pledged its talent to Audubon in a series of concerts to benefit Audubon of Florida's Florida Forever work. The first will be held at Theatre Jacksonville on January 21, 2008.

This concert will celebrate Florida's special places and demonstrate community support for natural area conservation in Florida. Celebrated Florida folk artists Amy Carol Webb and The Ashley Gang are donating their time to the event and all proceeds from ticket sales will be used to support Audubon's Florida Forever and Northeast Florida conservation advocacy.

Crosby Sanctuary Field Trip

We will meet at the Northwest corner of Blanding Blvd and Aurora Blvd, in VyStar Credit Union Parking Lot. Please don't forget to **carpool** with your friends! This is a joint fieldtrip with the Duval Audubon Society to their 400-acre sanctuary.

After a few hours of birding and native planting through disturbed uplands, intact mixed hardwood-cypress swamp, open power lines with marsh and forest edge, pine seepage slope, and upland oak hammock, we will convene at the sanctuary entrance for a native landscaping maintenance and work session. We will work for 1-2+ hours on pulling weeds, picking up roadway trash, inspecting the plants, spreading mulch, inspecting/cleaning existing bird nest boxes, and install new bird nest boxes for spring. Stay and work or play as long as you like!

Conservation News

Florida 2060, An Important Series of Reports FNPS Members Should Know

With close to 18 million residents in 2005, Florida already is overwhelmed with the ramifications of rampant sprawl, rapidly vanishing natural areas, and overcrowded roads. What will Florida look like in 2060, when its population is projected to reach almost 36 million? A recent study from 1000 Friends of Florida, (a nonprofit growth management watchdog organization), found that Florida population and developed land is projected to Double over the next 50 Years!

The first report, "Florida 2060: A Population Distribution Scenario for the State of Florida," projects that, based on current development patterns, the population of Florida will double in the next 50 years - to about 36 million (long since passing New York to become the third-largest state) - and that the amount of urbanized land in the state also will double.

The second report from 1000 Friends, "A Time for Leadership: Growth Management and Florida 2060," builds on the findings of Florida 2060 and offers series of recommendations for state leadership and citizens in Florida, such as expand the Florida Forever Program; adopt new policy on conversion of rural lands to urban use; create a 100 year legacy plan; and identify leaders and galvanize support.

More recently, the University of Central Florida released an **Alternative 2060** that shows how Florida can develop in a less costly and more environmentally sensitive manner. Major Alternative 2060 Recommendations include the following:

1. Protect Florida's Essential Land;
2. Invest in Balanced Transportation;
3. Plan for Climate Change;
4. Don't Waste Land
5. Design With Nature;
6. Encourage Compact Development;
7. Rebuild to Create Great Places

Many if not all of the recommendations fall in line with the FNPS mission to promote the preservation, conservation, and restoration of the native plants and native plant communities of Florida. The Conservation Subcommittee of the Ixia Chapter is working with other partner environmental organizations and FNPS Chapter Conservation committees to support such strategies in Florida.
